If you have more fictional works, consider how the systems in your story impact your characters. We're open to all your creativity, so give us what you've got!

If you have already submitted a piece, don't worry. All art interacts with systems as we are all humans living in a world that has rules and expectations. Let alone the fact that all art interacts with systems through the process of its creation alone, whether that's an MFA, writing groups, or even the process of submitting to literary magazines.

**Writing prompt:** What systems have impacted you the most lately? What systems are vital to you that operate under the surface? Write about them. Now how do those systems operate in your favorite fictional (or non-fictional character)? Do they care about the same systems? What would happen to you or your characters if one of those systems drastically changes? Write!

Our submissions are currently open, and will be through October. We'll put a louder call for submissions out in the fall when things pick back up again. But if you're interested, ponder systems! I'm excited to read your work starting in August.
